## **Christmas Services**


Sunday 15th December 6.30 pm Carols for Choir and congregation, and the Christmas readings. Mulled wine and mince pies afterwards.

#### John Findon writes:

I was brought up in the tiny Village of Pillerton in south Warwickshire. There Was a story still current (the man's family still living in the village) about a former Parish Clerk who attended the first visit by Mormon missionaries at a meeting in the Village Hall. The old man sat at the back with his large, black King James Bible, opened it at Genesis 1, and read with his loudest Church voice until the visitors gave up. He then cheerfully announced that 'the word of the Lord hath prevailed in Pillerton'.

I have never felt attracted to Mormon religion, but the Parish Clerk's use of the Bible is quite as alien to me. It made Scripture into a practically magical power at his disposal, of a piece with the way my mother would sometimes be driven to answer: 'but why have I got to...?' 'Because I say so'.

Many of you will have been shocked by the recent coverage of the physical abuse of young men by John Smyth, which led to the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury. One clergyman was quoted in the report saying that 'if this [the fact and nature of the abuse] became public it would set the Lord's work back in this country by twenty years'. So he, like so many others, did nothing.

We can all see how wrong that was. But it was not so very different from the way in which some clergy have for decades been willing (in order to 'protect their people' as they would probably say, and not 'set the Lord's work back') to keep truth, painstakingly researched from the study of the Scriptures, locked up in the Vicarage, never making itself heard in the pulpit. On the other hand, I have read attempts to argue that whales can't be mammals because the Book of Jonah calls them fish. The literalist use of Scripture is alive and at work. The broadcast media commonly assume that all Christians are signed up to it, choosing Genesis in opposition to Darwin, for example.

Yet it should surely be evident that to be afraid of truth is a kind of treason against the God of truth. And human beings are used to accessing truth in different ways, hoping to find it in Shakespeare as well as in Darwin.

In the last Link I mentioned plans for 'Agnostics Anonymous'. I have been surprised by how many have lifted their heads far enough above the battlements to speak to me about it. I plan that a group should meet in January, and shall be happy to hear from any others who might be interested.

#### Tidal Wave/ Tsunami

In early December 2004 I was working in a large private school in Bangkok Thailand, having retired from 40 years teaching in the UK. I was part of the English Programme and taught girls of 16-18 20<sup>th</sup> Century World History and Physical Geography.

As many of the girls came from families with luxury hotels and resorts in coastal Thailand and the islands although I had never seen a tidal wave I felt the need to make the students aware. I researched as best I could. I remember clearly telling the students that by carrying out my instructions it could save their lives. I described the sea pulling back and fishes flapping and rubbish visible on the sea bed. I told them to stop watching and to drop everything and run like mad in the opposite direction. I remember making them shout out the instructions loudly -Thais don't usually do this.

This is what happened to some of my 17-18 year old students on the morning of 26<sup>th</sup> December 2004. Whilst running they were in the company of elephants who had pulled up their stakes and charging in the same direction.

On returning to school in early January 2005 I was greeted with flowers, cards and presents. For me the most important thing were the letters from fathers thanking me for instructing the girls so well and saving their lives. *Jill Love, 20 years on*

The trees are cell-grown so will start as small but healthy plants. First come-first-served (and we will give away the remainder at the end of the market).





#### The New Paths at the Village Hall

You may have noticed the new paths connecting Henley Road with the recreation ground via the community orchard and the graveyard with a link to the Village Hall car park. There is now a vacancy on this friendly council which meets each month in the Village Hall on the first Monday of the month at 6.30pm.

Anyone over 18 is eligible, and we would particularly welcome any interest from the Park Homes or Heyford Hill parts of the village to ensure we have good representation for all villagers.

The parish council is an essential part of the structure of local democracy. Its role is to act on behalf of the village to:

- give views, on behalf of the community, on planning applications and other proposals that affect the parish
- undertake projects and schemes that benefit local residents
- work in partnership with other bodies to achieve benefits for the parish
- alert relevant authorities to problems that arise or work that needs to be undertaken
- and help the other tiers of local government keep in touch with their local communities.

The County and District Councillors usually attend to keep us informed about what is going on in the wider area, answer questions or put them to the right person if they don't know the answer. The Council minutes are posted on the website (www.sandfordonthames.org.uk) as well as on parish noticeboards.

#### **Rest in peace**

Tammy Holden-White b. 25<sup>th</sup> September 1987, d. 24<sup>th</sup> October 2024, aged 37

On 19<sup>th</sup> November several Sandford friends, including St Andrew's choir and Hannah on the harp, attended the Thanksgiving Service at Sutton Courtney for Tammy's life, and hope to plant a tree in her memory here in Sandford.

Tammy was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer shortly after the birth of her and Simon's son Tom, and the prognosis was dreadful. But Tammy lived on courageously, supported by friends and cared for by Simon and her birth family for six and a half years, so Tom's infancy was embraced by her love and will be enriched by memories. She was a radiant woman that none of us who knew her will forget, always wanting to help and serve her local community (she was briefly a councillor at Sandford before relocating).

At the cremation among the tributes Simon's mother Liz recalled St Paul's 'fruit of the Spirit' – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control (Galatians 5.22) and we all reflected on how wonderfully these flourished in Tammy. Our sympathies go to Simon and Tom and the wider family. Sorrow for a life cut short at 37 is softened by thankfulness for so much that was good in it.

**Martyn John Akrigg** b. 26<sup>th</sup> July 1978, d. 8<sup>th</sup> September 2024, aged 46 *Martyn's family write:* Son of John and Marlene, youngest of three children, he grew up in Sandford, where he had many friends. He went to Speedwell School and then on to Oxford Boys, where he made friends who stayed with him to

the end. Six of them carried him into the service at Garford.

Martyn met his wife Ruth while she was studying in Oxford, They married in July 2005 and moved to Didcot, and later to Chilton, where they had Ella, followed by Isla (R.I.P.) He worked for local electrical companies with John his dad, and became self-employed until 2021. He then worked for a national firm Baileys at Aldermaston. After working for only about 12 months for them he became unwell and cancer was diagnosed. He had many chemos and kept the faith that he was going to get through it, but sadly on 8<sup>th</sup> September this year he passed away with Ruth by his side.

He will be missed by all his family and his many, many friends. He was a great husband, father, son, brother, uncle and friend. May you rest in peace, Martyn – you were far too young to leave us all.

#### What I have learnt - by a retiring vicar

As I edge into the last phases of my life on <u>earth</u> I reflect on what I have learnt from a life with people and books. What the Bible (Old Testament prophets like Jeremiah) and history have taught me is that a society that abandons its gods is doomed, but that a small remnant will survive and rebuild, recovering the old wisdom and applying it with trust, hope and love to new situations - after the fall-out from nuclear catastrophe or global warming, or more senseless wars, disease and starvation.

The loss of God has happened to many in my lifetime - in the 1960s in good ways (more freedom, more tolerance) as well as bad (lack of selfdiscipline) and worse in the 1980s (more greed, greater inequality) and more dangerously in the past few years - reduced mental and spiritual health, less respect for human life, less care for our neighbours, especially the most vulnerable, uncertainty about truth and values.

And what should I be doing in some small way to stem the tide and build for the future?? Friendships. Reaching out. Teaching the ways that have worked in the past, thinking how they apply in a changed world. My personal responses are slightly different from my children's, and more from the young. I'm not even on TikTok or Facebook and I don't trust what I hear about Twitter. But they - you - must find ways to negotiate a changed world and hold our political and religious leaders to account, especially when they add to the decay. Change is often good, but decay? No thanks, so help me God. *Bob*

#### Parking, speed limits and traffic.

There has been a lot of speculation about the changes to the number of vehicles parking along Sandford / Henley Road and other places. The bulk of this additional parking is related to Laing O'Rourke, the main contractor for the Ellison institute in Armstrong way, a three-year project. Parking was restricted in Armstrong way and as a result, Sandford / Henley Roads filled up and the Heyford Hill lane junction became constricted and quite hazardous. HHL itself has also been negatively affected. The number of workers will significantly increase after the basic structure is completed and fitting out starts.

The planning application's quite vaguely written traffic management plan includes the Oxford City requirement that no construction traffic goes through Littlemore, so Sandford gets it all. Laing O'Rourke has been approached by Sandford PC and has been co-operative in trying to address the immediate problems. In order that the PC has its own record, please send your observations about parking, speeding or other Laing O'Rourke matters affecting Sandford to amandathompson@laingorourke.com with cc to clerk@sandfordonthames-pc.gov.uk .

The PC, in conjunction with Highways and Laing O'Rourke is trying to get double yellow lines around the HHL junction, the bridge and the bus stops, and also near the Littlemore Brook bridge where the road narrows to help stop inconsiderate / dangerous parking.

The PC have applied for a 20-mph limit in the village and the consultation on that has just closed. The stretch from the Armstrong Road traffic lights to the Littlemore Brook would remain at 30. As part of this, we want to place a speed measuring / warning device near the Littlemore Brook, the location recommended to the PC by the Highways department. So far, we have been unable to find a suitable location for a device for traffic from the South as there are reservations about all places suggested.

The VOCO hotel is in negotiations with Laing O'Rourke about creating temporary car parking on an area of their land between the hotel and Church Road but that has required a planning application which, if it is made, will take some time. We have been assured by Laing O'Rourke that access would not be from Church Road. Please make your own comments on any application, details of which will be found on the Parish website plus all the usual places.

#### Heyford Hill lane area addresses.

Finally, after several earlier attempts, the Post Office has relented and changed all the Heyford Hill lane area addresses from Littlemore to Sandford-on- Thames.

Thanks go to a local resident who initiated the process and persisted through the PO procedures to successfully make the change. The HHL area was in Littlemore until the boundary changes of the 1980's when land north of Grenoble road went into Oxford city and land bounded by the Thames, the Littlemore Brook and the A4047 came into Sandford. The vast majority of houses in that area were built after the boundaries altered but the PO still gave them Littlemore addresses rather than change the existing houses to Sandford- on-Thames. Good news that the PO has accepted the obvious reality.

**Apologies for absence**: Mark Baseby and Michael Whitlock. Cllr Sam Casey-Rerhaye (SODC) and Cllr Robin Bennett (OCC) did not attend.

**Reports from District and County Councillors**: Oxfordshire County Councillor report received and read.

Minutes: Minutes of the meeting held on 5 August approved and signed.

#### .1. Parking Issues

a. Significant increase in parked cars on Sandford Road, parking over the A4074 bridge towards Littlemore, and down through Sandford on Thames village. Access to Heyford Hill Lane compromised. Double Yellow lines around the junction for Heyford Hill Lane popular. Ellison project causing much of the issue. ACTION: Liaise with Littlemore PC

. b. Possibility of Voco Hotel providing temporary parking area for Ellison project– Laing O'Rourke contractors

#### 2. Village maintenance

*Contractors:* Contact contractors to tender for village maintenance work Work to include cutting back brambles, trees, removing trimmings, ad hoc work such as trees adjacent A4074 at Fox Furlong, mowing Broadhurst Gardens, cutting back brambles at the Wharf, Yeffley Drive brambles. Map of areas to be created.

*Road surface of Henley:* resident email covered in the Highways Walk & Talk. *Playground Update:* Broadhurst Gardens swing seats, get a quote for the enclosed seats as well as the standard swings.

*Review Kompan contract* for renewal terms: investigate other playground maintenance contractors and inspection providers.

Review inspection report: for serious issues and address at next meeting

*Report that railings on the cycle lane* at the end of Heyford Hill Lane have been removed, possible new lights/road planning taking place. No public signs or safety measures in place.

*Bus Stops*: Electronic signs no update yet. Maintenance is the responsibility of the Parish <u>Council</u>, volunteers have assisted in the past.

*Winter preparedness*: check salt bins at Heyford Hill Lane, Pheasant Walk, Henley Road, Church Road, entrance to village hall. Check Park Homes has one and if not order one including salt.

*Speed Sensors:* OCC meeting on site summary provided. Locations discussed e.g. flashing lights visible through some windows, mini roundabout/Brick Kiln Lane could rotate location, approach from Littlemore.

*Highways Walk & Talk:* Summary provided. Chase <u>Metalled</u> footpath enquiry with Rights of Way Officer.

#### 3. Miscellaneous

- Enquiry received relating to *fishing rights* and local angling clubs, ownership of islands in the R Thames <u>discussed</u>.Liaise with Kennington PC

- *Hedgehog awareness* signs available to alert drivers to hedgehogs crossing the road. ACTION: contact Sue for more information.

#### 4. Community Orchard Progress report:

Progress had been made on orchard/burial ground/recreation ground paths & gates.

#### 5. Village Hall

Parish Council have already resolved to assist the Village Hall committee with a charitable donation to support local community groups. Carried forwards: The parish council will determine an amount at the next meeting: request a copy of the Village Hall accounts.

#### 5. Parish maintenance

  - i. It was noted that the wild grass verges had not been cut as requested in future ask for them to be mowed at the end of August

- d, *Progress report on orchard* (PA) Progress on orchard/burial ground/recreation ground paths & gates (PA). Work due to begin this week.
- a. *Heyford Hill Lane address consultation*: The Parish Council had been contacted by residents asking about school catchment areas. It was noted that the parish has encountered difficulties accessing certain schools. The Parish Council assume that residents will respond to the address consultation in a private capacity if they so wish the PC are not a listed consultee.

*Church Road weeds in drains* reported by resident – Parish Clerk to check all gulleys clear as this was noted during the Highways walk in the summer

g. Brambles and nettles Yeffley Drive and Broadhurst Gardens, wharf site. Need to get brambles to revert back to grassland.

#### Additional Items:

a. It was noted that SWR had not provided enough materials for the mid rail outside Talking Shop. Parish Clerk to arrange delivery of materials and fitting.b. It was noted that the steps from the recreation field to the road had a new handrail, however the risers were at uneven heights

c. The Village Hall Chair requested assistance sourcing quotes for repainting the car park markings.

4. Playground Maintenance

a. Quotes for maintenance reviewed, Parish Clerk to ask for bi-annual quote from Kompan for comparison.

b. It was proposed and agreed to purchase replacement swing seats.

5. Village Hall Charitable Donation: The village hall committee provided financial information to enable the Parish Council to make a decision about proposed financial support. It was proposed and agreed that the Parish Council would provide a charitable donation of £3000 to the Sandford on Thames Village Hall charity, for the charity to decide how best to use. It was also proposed and agreed that there would be an annual review of charitable grants to the Village Hall every autumn.

- 6. Governance and consultations
- a. Councillor vacancies Parish Clerk to advertise this vacancy.
- b. Audit complete

c. Online identity for Parish Council to complement website – the Parish Council now has a simple Facebook page and an identity on the <u>Nextdoor</u>.

7. Finance report

a. Savings accounts opened, Instant access, <u>30 day</u> access and 90 day access. Parish Clerk to circulate the interest rates for each account. It was <u>propose</u> and agreed to maintain a balance of £20,000 in the current account, and the balance be transferred into the instant access account.

b. Parish Council budget to be added onto November agenda.

- 4. Highways & Parking Matters

a. MB located Laing O'Rourkes travel plan and construction management plan for the Ellison Project. Use of the local travel network by employees and contractors was encouraged. Does not appear to consider that people will drive to the site. The site is within Oxford City, Cllr SCR advised to recheck planning documents and speak to planners. The banksman has been present, assume role is for the duration of the <u>three year</u> build. Voco Hotel are intending to apply for planning permission for a car parking area on their land, but access will NOT be from Church Road. Query regarding access across the science park, currently a fence across the area.

Double yellow lines to be investigated as an option, queried whether they would be enforced. Laing O'Rourke in support of this, Clerk to chase. Community speedwatch discussed – a scheme supported by TVP. Parking permits discussed, not considered a viable <u>long term</u> solution. Long term parking on double yellow lines at the wharf occurring.

b. Noted resident email about parking issues in the parish

#### 5. Parish Maintenance

 a. SODC flooding engineer is arranging for a trash screen to be fitted at the end of the drain that became blocked and caused a flood at Fox Furlong

- b. Not possible to install a new bin at the end of Sandford Lane
- c. Parish maintenance to be reviewed at budget setting in December meeting

d. New paths in the community orchard have been cycled on, causing damage. Clerk to source some signs to ask cyclists not to use them.

#### 8. Playground Maintenance

- a. The Parish Council noted the safety check report provided by Kompan
- b. Cllr SCR noted that she still had some community grant money available
